Nautilus Professional **Building** converting to luxury apartments

The former Nautilus Professional Building at 6902 La Jolla Blvd. — which was built in 1964 and has traditionally housed dental and other medical offices - will reopen in early 2019 as a mixed-use luxury apartment complex with 15 one- and two-bedroom rentals, all with ocean views, and street-level retail space.

The 18,330-square-foot property — also known as 470 Nautilus St. — was sold last November by Lsref4 Dual LLC, a privately held Dallas, Texas company, to a San Diego concern called Hillcrest Veritas L.P. for \$9.15 million along with the adjacent commercial building at 6980 La Jolla Blvd.

Hillcrest Veritas, the Light has learned, is the real-estate investment subsidiary of the Murfey Company, the contractor that began the building's multimillion-dollar renovation in April.

"We specialize in development, investment and construction," said president Russ Murfey, who co-owns the company with his SEE NAUTILUS, A8

Geof Martin named Muirlands Middle School principal

Although it was not the path he set out on, in hindsight, incoming Muirlands Middle School principal Geof Martin was seemingly preordained for his new post. He starts in August and succeeds Harlan Klein, who will make the move to The Bishop's School as its Head of Middle School.

A native San Diegan, Martin and his wife Nancy (a teacher at the La Jolla Methodist Church preschool) have two grown children, Ryan and Kyle, who

"Every principal I worked with asked me if I wanted to be a principal, I always said no," Martin told La Jolla *Light*. He said he started in business, right out of high school, and worked his way up through a linen company, never even considering a career in education until his children were born. He got his teaching credential and in 1993 started teaching science at Pershing Middle School in San Carlos.

After 10 years: "I had a chance to work with a curriculum development project at San Diego State's Center for Research in Math and Science

Education," he explained. "And I really got a chance to see what teaching and learning was really about. How do you engage kids? How do you stimulate their interests? How do you provide them with opportunities to gather information and draw conclusions?"

From there, he joined a middle school leadership team and collaborated on a three-year project called the National Academy for Curriculum Leadership, under the **Biological Sciences Curriculum Study** (BSCS) in Colorado Springs.

E ach year in San Diego, an average of 20 pedestrians are killed and 500 pedestrians are wounded or seriously injured by vehicle crashes. The Residents for Torrey Pines Safety did not want to be a part of these grim statistics.

Representing hundreds of residents on the south side of Torrey Pines Road, they had no way of safely crossing this busy neighborhood thoroughfare. They organized to drive a grassroots effort for pedestrian safety.

After much collaboration over the course of 14-plus years, they recently celebrated the installation of a HAWK pedestrian signal (High-intensity Activated cross-Walk beacon) on Torrey Pines Road, between Amalfi and Princess Street, with the presence of representatives from the City.

Next to the chief benefit of saving residents from injury and death, there are many other advantages a community gains from having safe-crossing options.

These include promoting exercise, reducing the need for driving (and adding to parking congestion), and helping promote foot traffic to local businesses (for La Jollans access to The Shores and The Village areas).

This effort has taken diligence and consistent communication among The Residents for Torrey Pines Safety and La
